

### SPECIAL OLYMPICS 50TH ANNIVERSARY

In June of 1962, Eunice Kennedy Shriver – sister of brother Knight and President John F. Kennedy – held a summer day camp for young people with intellectual disabilities in her backyard. She was inspired to do something for this group of children after seeing limited opportunities for them to participate in athletic events. This was the revolutionary moment that eventually led to the first International Special Olympics Summer Games at Soldier Field in Chicago on July 20, 1968 – 50 years ago – where about 1,000 athletes from the U.S. and Canada competed.

Since the first games, the Knights of Columbus have been there. Here are the highlights of the 50-year history between the Knights and Special Olympics:

### Founding members of the Special Olympics were associated with the Knights of Columbus

Eunice Kennedy Shriver's brother, John F. Kennedy, was a Knight. Her husband, Sargent Shriver, was also a Knight. He was a member of the Mater Dei Council 9774 in Rockville, Md.

### The Knights have raised and donated more than \$600 million to the Special Olympics

The Knights of Columbus has collected and given more than \$600 million to programs for people with intellectual and physical disabilities, with the Special Olympics being among the largest benefactors.

### The Knights of Columbus has pledged to expand the Special Olympics

In 2005, the Knights of Columbus pledged to raise \$1 million in a four year period to help grow the Special Olympics in North America. The Order also pledged increased volunteer support for state and local games, as well as help to expand the program to underserved countries. The Knights of Columbus has subsequently extended that commitment through 2016.



## **SPOTLIGHT Bob Lamelle**

"Variety is the spice of life" certainly applies to Bob Lamelle, this month's focus for Spotlight.

Bob spent most of his young life in Long Island, NY. Perhaps that's where he became a Yankee fan, but now living in the Tampa Bay area he "roots, roots, roots for the home team," the Tampa Bay Rays. More about that later.

After graduating from high school, Bob went to college and majored in Business Administration. While concentrating on Business Administration he became a part of the college's yearbook and newspaper staffs. "Back then we used something unusual to write with," he said. "It was called a pen." He slyly smiled. He also loved going to movies, so writing feature articles about movie reviews was easy for him. In time he wrote regular news stories and thought maybe journalism might be his calling. However, he ended up being a copy editor, which was not to his liking, so he shifted gears.

He landed a job with a drug store by the name of Genovese Drugs and was with them for several years as manager. He also worked for Sears and JC

Penney as a sales-

person.

While in Long Island, Bob worked for a movie theatre. It had 1582 seats. Among other things, changed the margue. replaced burned-out light bulbs from a catwalk, and helped the projectionist keep the three projectors running smoothly. His assistant manager was a part-time magician, and he used Bob as a stage manager. "Naturally he explained every trick to me and that helped me get into magic (or illu-

sions, as the assistant manager would say), but that didn't last long.

"Due to the cold and snow and my desire for something new, I decided to join my parents anď move to Florida," Bob said.

While in Largo, he worked for York Air Conditioning, Hydraulic Supply Company, Kane's Furniture, and the Clearwater Housing Authority as purchasing

manager. He jokingly said that his involvement with a company seemed to be a kiss of death for them. The York distributorship folded, Hydraulic Sup-

ply relocated to Ft. Lauderdale, Clearwater Housing Authority closed their purchasing department, but is still going strong.

Bob decided to get his teaching certification in 2005 and has worked for Largo High School as a Social Studies teacher. Now semiretired he's subbing, mainly at Pinellas Park High School. It's more for love of education than money, since a sub's pay is about 80 dollars a

Rays in various capacities. He and his wife both filled out an application a few years ago and worked their way up. At first, they worked as one of the yellow shirted Fan Hosts which indicates someone who helps with tickets, escalators, and aisles. Bob later worked in the Draft Room, exclusively for seasonticket holders. He now is a part of the Rays' Club, an exclusive seating area where drinks and food are free and where the "high rollers" go to watch a

After our interview, Bob took me to his Sports' Room. It is FILLED with baseball memorabilia, ranging from pictures to autographed baseballs (lots of them!). His favorite is a ball autographed by Joe DiMaggio. If my sonin-law ever visits us, he MUST find some time to talk to Bob and see his collection. He might want to camp in the room overnight.

Bob has a unique story about how he became a Knight of Columbus. "Around 2000, I learned that the Knights had a softball team, and I wanted to play with them desperately. The only qualification was that I had to be a 1st Degree Knight," he said. "How hard could that be?" So he consented. Lo and behold, at that exemplification, they had a twofor-one deal, so he got his 2nd Degree at the same time. Shortly thereafter, he became a 3rd Degree Knight and is now a 4th Degree Knight. "I have held many officer positions," he said. "I was Deputy Grand Knight three times." He is now content to sit on the sidelines and take pictures at various events.

Bob has a scrapbook about 3 inches thick of Knights' pictures, bulletins, etc. from over the years It's very impressive and is a testimony of someone who knows how to collect and organize.





## THE LIVES OF SAINTS

### St. Vincent de Paul

St Vincent de Paul was born in 1581 in the village of Pouy to peasant farmers. There was in the vicinity a stream named the "Paul" and it is believed that this might have been the derivation of

the family name. He wrote the name as one word - Depaul, possibly to avoid the inference that he was of noble birth, but none of his correspondents did so. At an early age he showed a talent for reading and writing but during his childhood, he herded his family's livestock. At 15, his father sent him to seminary, managing to pay for it by selling the family's oxen.

Vincent's interest in the priesthood was largely with the intent to establish a successful career and obtain

a benefice with which he could retire early and support the family.

For two years, Vincent received his education at a college in France, adjoining a monastery of the Friars Minor where he and others resided. In 1597, he began his studies in the Faculty of Theology at the University of Toulouse. The atmosphere at the university was anything but pious or conducive to spiritual contemplation. Fights broke out between various factions of students which escalated into armed battles. An

official was murdered by two students. Nevertheless, he continued his studies and was finally able to help pay for his education by tutoring others. He was ordained on September 23, 1600, at

the age of nineteen. This was against the regulations lished by the Council of Trent which required a minimum of 24 years of age for ordination, so his appointment was appealed in the Court of Rome. Rather than respond to a lawsuit in which he would probably not have won, he resigned from the position and continued his studies. On October, 24 1604, he received his Bachelor of Theology. Later he received a Licentiate in Canon Law from the University of Paris. Early biographies of Vincent describe his capture and enslave-

ment during his two years away from France from 1605 to 1607. Subsequent biographies consider his enslavement a myth. The biographer Pierre Coste publicly confirmed the accuracy of Vincent's captivity and enslavement. Even so. Coste held the opposing view in private and questioned the reliability of the two letters supporting the account Vincent's enslavement. To avoid scandal and possible backlash, Coste kept his doubt of the slavery narrative private. Other scholars argue that details of Vincent's captivity narrative are implausible.

After returning to France, Vincent went to Rome. There he continued his studies until 1609, when he was sent back to France on a mission to King Henry IV.

Preaching a mission to the peasants on the Gondi estates persuaded him that he should direct his efforts to the poor. It was the Countess de Gondi who persuaded her husband to endow and support a group of able and zealous missionaries who would work among poor tenant farmers and country people in general.

In 1617, Vincent contacted the Daughters of Charity and they introduced him to poor families. Vincent took them food and comfort. He organized these wealthy women of Paris to collect funds for missionary projects, found hospitals, and gather relief funds for the victims of war and to ransom 1,200 galley slaves from Africa.

After working for some time in Paris among imprisoned galley slaves, he returned to be the superior of what is now known as the Congregation of the Mission, or the "Vincentians" These priests, with vows of poverty, chastity, obedience, and stability, were to devote themselves entirely to the people in smaller towns and villages.

Vincent was zealous in conducting retreats for clergy at a time when there was great laxity, abuse, and ignorance among them. He was a pioneer in clerical training and was instrumental in establishing seminaries. He spent twenty-eight years serving as the spiritual director of the Convent of St. Mary of Angels.

Vincent died in Paris on September 27, 1660.

### 4th Degree Exemplification, 1914

"The fourth degree was exemplified in Edmonton on Dominion Day under the direction of Master T. D. Deegan of Winnipeg. The occasion was honored by the presence of His Grace, the Archbishop of Edmonton and several of the clergy. After the ceremony the Knights marched to St. Joachim's Church for Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament, after which a splendid banquet was served, the toastmaster being Hon. Wilfred Gariepy, K.C. His Grace, Archbishop Legal was one of the speakers. Several other very pleasing addresses were made by prominent Knights."

### **ANOTHER FAMOUS CONVERSION:** NORMA McCORVEY ("JANE ROE")

Norma Nelson was born in Louisiana to an abusive mother, Mary, and a father who left when she was just a teenager. Her mother was an alcoholic, and when Norma was 16 years old, she married a sheet metal worker, Elwood McCorvey, and moved to California. She became pregnant with child, at which point he became violent. They had divorced by the time the child was born, and she moved back to Texas.

McCorvey actually gave birth three times. Her first daughter, Melissa, was legally adopted by Mary, her mother. Accounts have varied as to why Mary sought custody of Melissa. One theory is that Mary disapproved of Norma when her daughter confessed to her that her sexual preference was for women. Mary, however, said that she actually adopted Melissa because of McCorvey's drinking and drug use, as well as her promiscuity with both men and women. Later, McCorvey had a second child who was raised by the child's father.

In 1969, at the age of 21, McCorvey became pregnant a third time and returned to Dallas. According to Mc-Corvey, friends advised her that she should assert falsely that she had been raped and that she could thereby obtain a legal abortion under Texas's

law which prohibited abortion. Due to lack of police evidence or documentation, scheme was not successful and McCorvey would later admit the situation was a fabrication. She attempted to obtain an illegal abortion, but the respective clinics had been closed by authorities.

Eventually, McCorvey was referred to attorneys Linda Coffee and Sarah Weddington who were looking for pregnant women

seeking abortions. The case took three years of trials to reach the Supreme Court of the United States, and Norma never attended a single trial. In the meantime, she had given birth to the baby in question, who was eventually adopted. Ironically, despite being pregnant three time, McCorvey never had an abortion.

McCorvey revealed herself to the press as being "Jane Roe" soon after the decision's issuance and stated that she sought an abortion because she was unemployable and greatly depressed. In the 1980s, McCorvey asserted that she had been the "pawn" of two young and ambitious lawyers (Weddington and Coffee) who were looking for a plaintiff with whom they could challenge the Texas state law prohibiting abortion.

In time, McCorvey became a pro-

choice poster child, working for women's centers in Texas and California in the '80s and early '90s. But in 1995, Operation Rescue, a Christian group focused on making abortion illegal, moved in next door to the Dallas abortion clinic where she worked. McCorvey bonded with members of the group over time and was baptized in August of that year. She then became an ardent pro-life activist, and in 1998 she converted to Catholicism. Bill Price, the 1995 head of Texans United for Life said of her transition, "The poster child has jumped off the poster."


After McCorvey's 1995 conversion, she told the The Washington Times, "I am not a lesbian. I'm a child in Christ now." She continued to live with her partner Connie Gonzalez in what she called a platonic relationship. In 2005, after Gonzalez suffered a stroke that left her mostly incapacitated and in need of constant care, McCorvey moved out, leaving her partner for good. Everything that tied her to Roe v. Wade was left to collect dust in Gonzalez's garage.

In 2006, McCorvey was one of the protestors arrested at University of Notre Dame. They had gathered to protest President Barack Obama's commencement speech. Telling The Guardian that President Obama wasguilty of "child killing," she also said, "When I got arrested, I loved it! I felt like I was high. But it was a God high. I'd never been arrested before. But who better to be arrested for unborn children?"

McCorvey died of heart failure in Katy, Texas, on February 18, 2017, at the age of 69.

### What does the Catechism of the Catholic Church say about....Judgment after Death?

1051 Every man receives his eternal recompense in his immortal soul from the moment of his death in a particular judgment by Christ, the judge of the living and the dead.

1052 "We believe that the souls of all who die in Christ's grace . . . are the People of God beyond death. On the day of resurrection, death will be definitively conguered, when these souls will be reunited with their bodies"

1053 "We believe that the multitude of those gathered around Jesus and Mary in Paradise forms the Church of heaven, where in eternal blessedness they see God as he is and where they are also, to various degrees, associated with the holy angels in the divine governance exercised by Christ in glory, by interceding for us.

1054 Those who die in God's grace and friendship imperfectly purified, although they are assured of their eternal salvation, undergo a purification after death, so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of God.

1056 Following the example of Christ, the Church warns the faithful of the "sad and lamentable reality of eternal death" (GCD69), also called "hell."

1057 Hell's principal punishment consists of eternal separation from God in whom alone man can have the life and happiness for which he was created and for which he longs.

1060 At the end of time, the Kingdom of God will come in its fullness. Then the just will reign with Christ for ever, glorified in body and soul, and the material universe itself will be transformed. God will then be "all in all" (1 Cor 15:28), in eternal life.
